Brief Statement of Faith

Doris Chandler

All things are created by God. God is “maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible.”¹ The emerald iridescent wings of a Ruby Throated hummingbird... the howl of wolves at sunset on a frosty winter’s night...the flicker of a firefly on a sultry summer evening are breathtaking examples of God’s unbounded imagination, creativity and penchant for diversity. Human beings are made in the image of God...born with a strand of stardust and an imprint of holiness that nudges us to long for a connection to something greater than ourselves...beyond ourselves...to God.

I love to think about what I believe and why and welcome the occasion to exchange ideas in conversation with others. So before I make my next set of statements, I want to say with clarity that the exercise of the mind and thinking deeper thoughts about God are not drivel. What I am trying to establish is what Peter Enns in The Sin of Certainty says, “The deeper problem is the unspoken need for our thinking about God to be right in order to have a joyful, freeing, healing, and meaningful faith. The problem is trusting our beliefs rather than trusting God.”² My theological library is replete with theologians’ worthy attempts to explain and understand the nature of God, the Trinity, and the Resurrection to name a few theological topics. While the wisdom of theologians is invaluable, I believe no matter how cogent the theological constructs, God is in the business of breaking free of them. God will do what God will do and will show up in unexpected ways. Isn’t that marvelous and astounding that we worship a God that is Holy Other...a God who is with us and for us but will not be restrained by us and our limited thoughts and/or language of God? God resists being confined by our finite minds.

God told Moses, “I AM WHO I AM.”³ How we speak of God matters. Rich inclusive language for and about God opens us to new possibilities for thinking about God. The God of Abraham and Sarah...the God who delivered Israel from captivity reaches out to us in love. Like a mother who will not forsake her nursing child, like a father who runs to welcome the prodigal home, God’s faithfulness is steadfast and sure. “God is love and we love God because [God] first loved us.”⁴

“God is not elsewhere and heaven is not later. The presence of God is infinite, everywhere and always forever. One cannot, not be in the presence of God. There is no other place to be. Wherever we are, God is. God’s divine energy flows through us.”⁵ “The notion that God is elsewhere is overcome through the Incarnation... ‘The Word became flesh and lived among us’^{6,7} God in Jesus became flesh. God visibly moved in with the material world to help us overcome the illusion of separation”⁸

Jesus is the very imprint of God. Jesus walked the dusty roads of God’s world feeding the hungry, healing the sick, teaching in parables, binding wounds, and transforming lives. Today Jesus walks the dusty roads of our lives through the power of the Holy Spirit. Jesus’ life and death are pregnant with the power of reconciliation, redemption and the refreshing embrace of a forgiving love. Jesus calls us to discipleship and to the transformation of our souls. Jesus reconciling power is an expression of God’s extravagant, indiscriminate, inclusive, divine love and grace, and a bold witness to God’s resurrection power. Power that proclaims life not death has the last word. “We are children of the resurrection and we are both burdened and brightened by a cosmic and irrepressible hope. We are both burdened and brightened with a gift of an optimism whose headwaters are not rational or provable, and yet are endlessly knowable to us”⁹ as we humbly abide in the love of God.

The Holy Spirit is God’s gift to us as we journey forth in life. The Spirit of God pursues us, causes us to realize that God’s grace surrounds us and makes a claim upon our lives. This same Spirit moves us to call out to God, say yes to God’s love for us, and commit our lives in service to and adoration of God. The Holy Spirit guides us into all truth and is both our Comforter; and when we need it, our Dis-Comforter. The Spirit of God calls us to dynamic transformation and reformation. The dynamism of the Spirit of God

is ever nudging us toward that which is good, lovely and true....toward unflinching unity as we honor diversity...toward being fully present in each moment and knowing we are one with God and all of creation.¹⁰

Jeromey Howard Statement of Faith

I believe in the Triune God – The Creator, Sustainer and Redeemer of all things. I believe that by the Holy Spirit, God calls people to Jesus Christ, God's only Son, who is experienced as both our brother and our Lord. And that in Christ all humanity is offered purpose and salvation. I believe that God's purpose has been and always will be present; that it is fully revealed to us in the incarnation, life, ministry, death, bodily resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ.

I believe that Jesus Christ was both fully human and fully divine, that he fulfilled the Hebrew Scriptures. Jesus freed the captives, healed the sick, cast out demons, gave a voice to those who had been silenced and brought the good news to all. By unyielding obedience to God, Jesus Christ was betrayed and abandoned by those closest to him, arrested, tried, tortured and executed. In his death, he took upon himself the full force of all the violence and sins of humanity; all while asking God to forgive those who would slay him.

I believe that Jesus Christ truly and fully died, was buried and on the third day was raised from the dead by God his father, overcoming the powers of sin and evil. This fulfillment of God's promise, the resurrected Jesus, was witnessed first by women devoted to following him and then by his disciples and others. Jesus then commissioned his followers to participate in the mission of God; calling them to make disciples of all nations and baptizing them in the name of the Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

I believe that through the fullness of Christ, God offers us salvation. That even in the brokenness and sinfulness of humanity we are justified by grace through faith alone. That through our relationship with God we are freed from the powers of death and sin; in the literal, political, social, economic, cultural or psychological form.

I believe that the mission of God continues today by the power of the Holy Spirit, through the creation and sustaining of a world-wide community, the church. The Spirit claims us to be God's people. The Spirit frees us from the power of sin and death to do God's mission In Jesus Christ, the Living Word. The Spirit guides our faith and life through the reading of the Scriptures. The sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ways we express our entrance into and our ongoing life in the family of God, expressing thanksgiving and praise for the divine grace offered to us through Jesus Christ.

I believe in our baptism we die with Christ and that we are reborn in the life of Christ, the life of God. That in this death and rebirth we conquer, through Christ, the kingdoms of this world and allowed to live in the kingdom of God.

Jeromey Howard Statement of Faith

In the Lord's Supper we are given the grace filled gift of participation in the family of God, remembering the broken body and the shed blood of Jesus Christ; the cost that was paid so all of us are able to be called daughters and sons of God. I believe that when we participate in the sacraments we are joyfully anticipating the return of Christ and the coming reign of the Kingdom of Heaven.

I believe that there is nothing that can separate us from the love and grace of the Triune God. There is no human force or action that can overcome God choosing us, Christ dying for us and the Holy Spirit working in and through us. In all this we are called to be a part of God's work in the world. The utter joy that is brought forth in the face of such love and grace I can do little but offer a prayer of "Thank you."

My faith follows fairly orthodox reformed theology. Scripture, experience, community, tradition and the Holy Spirit help guide my understanding and beliefs. But I want to expand on two points. First and foremost we are created for relationship. God created us in God's image to be in relationship with God and to be in relationship with one another. It is how we experience joy and love and wholeness and intimacy, whether through casual acquaintances, faithful friends or committed partners. We allow ourselves to be truly known in relationship, casting off pretense and experiencing that agape love that is God, and comes from God. We are made for relationship, and it is in loving our family, our partners, our spouses, our friends, our neighbors, our enemies, the suffering and the strangers that we live out God's vision for the world, which we also call the Kingdom of God.

The second central tenet of my faith is that grace is what makes all of this possible. Growing up a Baptist, one of the central foundations of faith was that you must choose God. As a child this felt powerful and personal to make my decision to be a follower of Christ. And while this decision-making theology has its strengths, for the life of faith is a decision we make daily, the older I got the less fit I felt to be a follower of Christ. The more I became aware of my own brokenness and flaws, the more I saw how deeply the systemic sin in this world went, and how impossible it was to extricate myself from it. Even if I wanted to "choose" Christ's way, I felt utterly incapable and unfit for the task. This is where the reformed understanding of grace lifted me up and put me back on the path. We are not perfect. In this world of brokenness we are incapable of doing something that does not have complicated ramifications. But God loves us; God is with us and for us, and God does not expect us to be perfect, but instead uses our weaknesses towards the good of all things. This grace that God gave me freed me of the burdens I carried. It empowered me to seek out where the Holy Spirit was already at work in people's lives, and where my brokenness instead could become a blessing. This is the grace that led me to a variety of ministries. God doesn't need me to be perfect. God needs me to be present. And through this ministry and this understanding of grace and love, I have seen God doing amazing things.

I believe God is love. God's very being is relational as God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit participate in this mutual indwelling, this divine dance among themselves. This beautiful relationship overflows into God's creation as our Creator continues to seek relationship with us and our participation in God's creative works.

While we, as sinners, continue to turn away from God, God continues to move towards us. Fully human and fully God, Jesus Christ reveals that God still desires to be in relationship with us. Through his teachings, Jesus reveals how we are to live into that relationship. Through his death, Jesus reveals that God's gracious love for us has no bounds. Through his resurrection, Jesus makes reconciliation possible, something we could not do on our own. This grace is a freely given gift to all of God's people by God through Jesus Christ.

I believe the Holy Spirit is what makes our faith a communal faith, for it binds us in relationship with God, Jesus Christ, and all believers as the one body of Christ, the Church. Through the Spirit, God works to transform us into a new creation and bring the Kingdom of God nearer. The Spirit inspires us to come together with our gifts in order to share the gospel with each other and to build onto each other's faith through teaching, worship, and fellowship. The Spirit also calls us to go out into the world as witnesses to the grace of God through Jesus Christ with the Spirit as our guide.

I believe Scripture is the inspired Word of God, the revelation of God to the Church and the world. Through the Spirit, we read Scripture to know God, and, in turn, to know ourselves. With the actual text and its context in mind, we listen to what Scripture has to say to us today about the grace that has been extended to us and how we are called to participate in God's creative works.

I believe the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper serve as outward signs of God's grace extended to us through Jesus Christ. In Baptism, we are welcomed into relationship with God by letting our sinful lives die and beginning a new life in Christ. Through the Lord's Supper, we remember the sacrifice that Jesus Christ made for us out of gracious love, and we are empowered as a community to extend that love to the world. When we participate in these Sacraments, God is present and, through the Spirit, we are connected to all Christians who came before us, who are with us now, and who have yet to come. We celebrate the Sacraments as a community also to remember God's invitation to participate in God's mission for a new creation.

We remember that same invitation through our history as the Church. As a confessional church, we believe, through our creeds, confessions, and catechisms, we are able to acknowledge how God has been at work through the Church in the past and how God continues to work through us today. Through the Spirit, we are able to learn from our history in order to continue assisting the coming of God's new creation.

Your HRP Council acted on your behalf and within its commission in the following ways:

1. Approved a Partnership between HRP and PresbyBuild.
2. Co-sponsored the Annual Thanksgiving Diversity Breakfast (November 16), and of the Multifaith Service on Racial Equality worship service (Sunday January 28th at 4 pm) organized by the Westchester American Jewish Committee along with multiple denominations.

GENERAL PRESBYTER

(Approved by Council: 10-3-17)

Purpose: To provide strong, dynamic leadership that will assist the Presbytery of Hudson River (HRP) to do its mission and achieve its ministry goals all the Glory of God.

Accountability: Accountable to HRP through the Council and Personnel Committee.

Relationships: Relates to the leaders, committees, congregations, pastors, staff and ecumenical partners of HRP.

Responsibilities:

1. Work to strengthen the connection of HRP congregations and their leaders with each other and HRP in order for HRP to fulfill its Constitutional responsibility “for assisting and supporting the witness of congregations to the sovereign activity of God in the world, so that all congregations become communities of faith, hope, love, and witness” (G-3.0301).
2. Exercise pastoral leadership in HRP and with its congregations and pastors, celebrating in times of joy and reaching out compassionately in times of need, communicating to HRP, when appropriate, the need for prayers of thanksgiving or intercession.
3. Chair and provide effective guidance to the Council in such a way that the Council will have HRP doing its Mission, getting closer to its Vision, while living out its Core Values, and challenging its congregations and leaders to be faithful and courageous, hopeful and future oriented, innovative and transformational while practicing strong stewardship.
4. Collaborate with the ministry teams of Council in assisting them with attaining their respective goal.
5. Encourage the creation of Partnerships around the passion of congregations and leaders.
6. Serve as head of staff, supervising staff and evaluating staffing needs in such a way as to align staff work with HRP’s vision, values mission and ministry goals.
7. Liaison with and provide staff support to the committees assigned by the Council, which are currently the following: Budget, Finance and Property/Trustees, Committee on Ministry (COM), Committee on Preparation for Ministry, Committee on Representation and Nominations, Grants Committee and Personnel Committee.
8. Work closely with COM, conducting reference checks on pastor candidates and, as appropriate, training PNC’s and attending visits with sessions.
9. Represent HRP with the councils of the church as well as HRP’s ecumenical partners.
10. Work to strengthen the connection of HRP congregations and their leaders with the Holmes Camp and Conference Center (jointly owned with the presbyteries of Long Island and New York City), the Synod of the Northeast and the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).
11. Perform other duties as directed by the Council and as time allows.

Qualifications:

1. A strong and growing faith in God in Jesus Christ and grounded in a keen understanding of Reformed Theology and Presbyterian polity.
2. A Ruling Elder or Minister of Word and Sacrament in Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).
3. Demonstrated ability to relate to a diversity of theological perspectives, cultures, races, ethnicities, age, and socio-economic levels and to move comfortably between and within them.
4. Demonstrated ability to provide innovative and visionary organizational leadership rooted in spiritual depth.
5. Demonstrated experience implementing organizational goals similar to the adopted ministry goals of HRP: healthy, vital communities of faith; strong, transformative leadership; and partnerships.
6. Be practiced at and delight in collaborative and collegial leadership.
7. Ability to balance life and work.

Type: Full-time (on average 50 hours per week), salaried/exempt called position.

Terms/Compensation/Benefits: Determined by the Council through the Personnel Committee, ordinarily on an annual basis, but shall include the full traditional plan of the Board of Pensions.

Review: An annual review will be conducted by the Personnel Committee with involvement of the Council.

- 3. Staff salaries are allocated between the per capita budget and the mission budget as follows:
 - Per Capita: 1/2 of expenses of general presbyter, all expenses related to stated clerk, office manager, manager of finance, and journal clerk.
 - Mission: 1/2 of the general presbyter, the director of communications, the office assistant.

TREASURER

(Approved by Presbytery of Hudson River's Council)

Purpose: To provide oversight for the financial activities, procedures, policies, reports and statements for the Presbytery of Hudson River (HRP) and its corporation in consultation with the Budget Finance and Property Committee/Trustees (BFP) and the Council.

Bylaws of Presbytery of Hudson River (May 23, 2017)

Article IV OFFICERS

Section 2 The officers elected by the Presbytery shall have the following duties (other duties may be specified by rule). The Treasurer shall oversee the finances of the Presbytery, having such authority as may be necessary to receive, invest, transfer and disburse funds on behalf of the Presbytery, always subject to the Presbytery's rules, policies and oversight.

Section 4 The officers of the Presbytery shall be elected in the following manner:... The Stated Clerk and Treasurer shall ordinarily be elected at the final stated meeting of the calendar year in the third year of the officer's term, and his or her term shall begin on January 1 of the following year.

ARTICLE VI TRUSTEES

Section 2 The officers of the Corporation shall be as follows: the Budget, Finance and Property Committee chairperson shall serve as President of the Corporation, the Stated Clerk shall serve as Secretary and the Treasurer shall serve as Treasurer. The officers shall have a voice and vote on corporate matters.

Type: A volunteer position, elected by the Presbytery upon recommendation by the Council and the Trustees, to a three year term.

Accountability: Council, through the BFP.

Relationships: BFP and its chair, Council, Manager of Finance and General Presbyter.

Responsibilities:

1. Serve as a member of Trustees of HRP and an officer of the Corporation.
2. Serve as a voting member of BFP and its Investment Subcommittee.
3. Work with the Manager of Finance, providing direction as needed, to ensure that all approved financial policies and procedures are followed and work is accomplished, sharing any concerns with the General Presbyter, who is Head of Staff.
4. Recommend financial policies and procedures to ensure compliance with the applicable internal controls as entailed in HRP's Treasurer's Manual.
5. Provide an analysis of the financial report to BFP on a not less than quarterly basis along with any appropriate counsel and commentary.
6. Oversee the annual budget development process.
7. Schedule and oversee, with the assistance of the Manager of Finance, the annual audit and review and present the final audit report to BFP. As the Book of Order states in G-3.0113: "A

full financial review of all financial books and records shall be conducted every year by a public accountant or committee of members versed in accounting procedures. Reviewers should not be related to the treasurer(s). Terminology in this section is meant to provide general guidance and is not intended to require or not require specific audit procedures or practices as understood within the professional accounting community.”

8. Review the insurance needs of HRP and make recommendations to BFP.
9. Coordinate, along with the Investment Subcommittee, the management of HRP's investments.
10. Ensure compliance with any HRP, Synod or General Assembly reporting requirements.
11. Keep all matters appropriately confidential and conduct all responsibilities with appropriate discretion.
12. Assist BFP with an annual evaluation of the work of this position.
13. Assist BFP with training the next Treasurer.

Skills and Knowledge: General accounting procedures; QuickBooks and computer skills; follow through; confidentiality.

Review: This position description and person will be reviewed at least annually by the BFP and at the request of the Council.
